APIDA Center gets a CSU AANHPI SAP Grant!

The CSU Chancellor's Office announced in May that \$6.4 million in funding would be awarded to campuses as part of the CSU Asian American Native Hawaiian Pacific Islander (AANHPI) Student Achievement Program (SAP). These funds will be used to create programs and services to support low-income, underserved, first-generation AANHPI students. This money is part of an annual \$8 million appropriation as directed by Assembly Bill (AB) 190 to support Asian American Native American Pacific Islander Serving Institutions (AANAPISIs) and to establish a central statewide office.

Nineteen CSUs participated in a call for proposals for one-time funding last fall. Awards ranged from \$200,000 to \$460,000. SDSU received \$360,000 of those funds, one of the highest awards throughout the system.

The Chancellor's Office also allocated an additional \$500,000 to support AANAPISI efforts - of which \$350,000 will be made available to campuses in the form of mini-grants of \$10,000 to \$50,000 to support faculty and staff engaged in AANAPISI-centered work.

At the heart of the efforts to secure both of those funding sources for the university was Dr. **Virginia Loh-Hagan**. Dr. Loh-Hagan, who will manage the mini-grant funds for the entire CSU system and the AANHPI SAP funds for SDSU, said the funding signals the system's commitment to its Asian American students, faculty and staff.

Dr. Loh-Hagan said the \$360,000 will fund a project called ACCESS (APIDA College & Career Excellence in Scholarships and Success), which aims at improving college achievement for underserved APIDA students. The ACCESS project will have two major programs: (1) The APIDA College Experience Success (ACES) program which will create learning support communities that will target at-risk students, and (2) The Students and Teachers for APIDA Research and Scholarship (STARS) program which will build students' academic skills and help establish an APIDA Research Center. Dr. Loh-Hagan also said some of the funds will go to support the Asian American Studies program and help expand an APIDA collection. She said, "The funding gives us an opportunity to think about what we are doing and how we can do it better, with the ultimate goal of advancing our AANAPISI identity and supporting our students and faculty and staff."

Dr. Loh-Hagan credits the new funding to a statewide collaborative effort among AANAPISI leaders that started during the height of the pandemic, when escalating anti-Asian hate galvanized efforts within the CSU system to send a firm message of support to the system's APIDA students, which comprise more than 16 percent of the student body statewide. That working group was spearheaded by Dr. Loh-Hagan, Dr. Tim Fong (Sacramento State), and Dr. Simon Kim (CSU Long Beach).


"This really brought us all together in a way that we weren't before," Dr. Loh-Hagan said. "We know that solidarity and working together across the system is what got us the funding in the first place, so we want to ensure that we continue to have conversations and build networks."

One of the things the annual \$8 million allotment funds is the development of a statewide central office. The CSU System held a request for proposals in 2023 and chose Sacramento State as the location for the office. Dr. Fong was recently named the office's inaugural executive director and will oversee future grant distributions. Sacramento State has the oldest continuously funded AANAPISI program in the nation. (Note that Dr. Loh-Hagan had submitted an application on behalf of SDSU, marking our campus as a main player in the AANAPISI space.)

Dr. Loh-Hagan said, "To be able to have access to this funding and this support and this recognition is pretty powerful. We aim to continue to build and establish a strong APIDA presence at SDSU." With the establishment of the Office for AANAPISI Affairs, SDSU is poised to be a national model for APIDA excellence.

APIDA Center learns about Undocumented Filipinx Americans in San Diego!

<u>Undocumented Week of Action</u> is October 14-18, 2024. In addition, October is <u>Filipinx American History Month</u>. So, let's learn about Undocumented Filipinx Americans in San Diego.

In October 1587, the first Filipinos landed in Morro Bay, California; as such, they are the oldest ethnic immigrant group in the nation. Today, they are the fourth largest immigrant group with over two million Filipino immigrants residing in the United States. They are also the seventh-largest undocumented community with over 310,000 undocumented immigrants in the United States; however, it's estimated that there are more in "hiding." (Undocumented Filipino immigrants are known as "TNT" or "tago nang tago" which is Tagalog for "hiding and hiding.")

The rise of the undocumented Filipinx American community occurred as a result of restrictive immigration policies, such as the Tydings-McDuffie Act of 1934, which classified Filipinos as "aliens." Many Filipino immigrants often become undocumented by overstaying their temporary visas to join relatives already residing in the United States.

According to a 2019 report by <u>Migration Policy Institute</u>, about 9% of the total population of undocumented immigrants in San Diego identified as Filipino. In 2020, approximately 156,000 undocumented immigrants lived in San Diego County. About 5.6% of the undocumented immigrant population at the time was born in the Philippines.

In addition to the SDSU APIDA Center, the Undocumented Resource Center (URC) is a resource that supports undocumented students and mixed-status families. For those who identify with the Undocumented APIDA community, we are here for you! Come to our UndocuAPIDA Support Group!
