

#### APIDA Center learns about APIDA sheroes!


Political measures and media portrayals have shaped the harmful perceptions of Asian and Asian American women as submissive and exotic. Asian American women have endured a long history of hypersexualization and fetishization. As a result, APIDA women have often become victims of sexual assault and violence.

Sexual assault and harassment are prevalent among college students. According to the 2022 Sexual Violence Campus Climate Survey Report by SDSU, 22% of over 5,000 respondents indicated that they had experienced some form of sexual assault. Out of the 5,000 respondents, almost 30% identified as APIDA.

Several APIDA activists have spoken out about their experiences, amplifying the narratives of other victims and advocating for their rights. One such advocate is Amanda Nguyen (born 1991), a Vietnamese American activist who survived sexual assault while attending Harvard University. Her experience navigating the complexities of the legal system ignited her to seek justice and ensure that other victims have more support. Nguyen created *Rise*, a nonprofit organization dedicated to advocating for the rights of sexual assault survivors. Nguyen's efforts led to the passage of the Sexual Assault Survivors' Bill of Rights in 2016, a landmark legislative achievement ensuring that survivors have essential rights, such as the preservation of their rape kits. Nguyen also brought her movement to the United Nations, where they unanimously voted to pass a resolution recognizing rape in peacetime and condemning all forms of sexual and gender-based violence.

Another advocate is Chanel Miller (born 1992), a Chinese American writer who was an anonymous victim of sexual assault at Stanford University in 2015. After being known as "Emily Doe" through the investigation of her case, Miller published a victim impact statement in 2019 reclaiming her name and her story. In August 2019, Miller's memoir entitled *Know My Name* was published. It sparked a nationwide discussion about rape on college campuses and how survivors were not being heard.

Nguyen and Miller bravely shared their stories in an effort to help others. SDSU offers many resources to help students facing sexual harassment. Please reach out to the APIDA Center so we can connect you to a support system.

### **APIDA Center honors Day of Remembrance!**

The <u>Day of Remembrance</u> is observed to memorialize the signing of Executive Order 9066 by President Franklin D. Roosevelt (1882-1945) on February 19, 1942. This order authorized the forced removal and incarceration of over 120,000 Japanese Americans, two-thirds of whom were U.S. citizens. This incarceration has impacted and continued to impact generations of Japanese Americans. The purpose of this day is to honor the resilience of those affected, educate future generations about the dangers of wartime hysteria and racial prejudice, and ensure that such injustices never occur again.

On Wednesday, February 19, 2025, the APIDA Center in partnership with the University Art Gallery hosted a <u>Cultural Education Program</u> about the Day of Remembrance. We learned more about the Japanese American incarceration experience, Clara Breed (a San Diego librarian who wrote letters to children in the incarceration camps), contemporary examples, and more.

# **Opportunity: Angel Island**





### APIDA Center supports NEH trip to Angel Island!

In partnership with Montclair University and The Asian American Education Project, the APIDA Center is hosting an educational trip to San Francisco, funded by the National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH). This NEH K-12 Institute invites K-5 educators to dive deep into the overlooked stories of Asian American immigration through Angel Island. Over two weeks, teachers will explore the impact of exclusionary policies on individuals and communities, learning how to bring these complex histories into the classroom in meaningful ways. Through site visits, workshops, and lectures, participants will gain the skills to approach immigration as more than a single story and to guide students in asking critical questions. By the end, participants will create resources for their own classrooms and districts, supporting a richer, more inclusive approach to teaching history. All participating teachers will be given a \$2200 stipend to use to travel to Angel Island in San Francisco. This program was inspired by the APIDA Center's trip to the Angel Island Immigration Station and San Francisco, which we took last December. We learned so much about early Asian American immigration and visited museums, the oldest Chinatown in the United States, and more.


