APIDA Center learns about archery!

Archery's origins trace back to the discovery of flint arrowheads from around 20,000 BC. The sport originates from Egyptian and Nubian bow and arrow practices for hunting and warfare. Since then, distinctive styles of archery equipment and techniques have developed. Asia alone is home to at least a dozen cultures with rich archery traditions. For example, in Japan, traditional archery is known as $ky\bar{u}d\bar{o}$, originally called $ky\bar{u}jutsu$, meaning "art of archery." Once central to Samurai warfare, it shifted during the Edo period (1603–1868) toward a more ceremonial and spiritual practice.

Kyūdō was introduced to the United States in 1980 by Kanjuro Shibata XX (1921-2013), a master archer whose family served as imperial instructors and bow makers. That same year, the first American dojo, Ryuko Kyudojo, was founded in Colorado. Soon after, more than 25 dojos were established. Although far from its origins, Kyūdō in the United States remains true to tradition. Practitioners use the asymmetrical longbow (yumi) and arrows (ya), following foundational techniques such as footing, posture, drawing, and release.

San Diego Kyudo (hosted at North County Aikikai) was founded in February of 1993 by Satoshi Takamori (born 1955). Takamori spent most of his life in Japan until he was invited to San Diego in 1986 to teach kyūdō. One of his first students, Jannette Curran (born 1995), now leads the San Diego Kyudo Dojo. Today, the *dojo* is home to a diverse group of students, all donning traditional attire consisting of a *keiko-gi* top, pleated *hakama*, belt, and sandals.




APIDA Center learns about Hawaiian connections in San Diego!

On May 9, 2025, the APIDA Center hosted a field trip to learn more about San Diego sites of interest connected to Hawaiian history. First, we visited the "Aloha Vaqueros" exhibit at the San Diego History Center. We learned about the history of *vaqueros* (cowboys) in Alta and Baja California and of *paniolos* (Hawaiian cowboys) in Hawaii and San Diego.

We also learned about the history, including the haunted history, of the Davis-Horton House, which was the home of William Heath Davis (1822-1909), a founding father of San Diego's downtown area. Davis, known as "Kanaka Bill," was born in Honolulu, HI and was one-quarter Native Hawaiian as his maternal grandmother was Mahi Kalanihooulumokuikekai, a high chiefess from Oʻahu.

We also learned about early Native Hawaiian laborers in Shelter Island and Point Loma, in addition to Hawaiian connections to San Diego military history. Then, we ate Spam Musubis from Ono Grindz, a local Hawaiian-owned eatery in Liberty Station Public Market.

From 5-8pm, we also hosted Finals Fun activities. This semester, we practices sustainable stitching, weaved potholders, played games, and watched movies!








APIDA Center celebrates Hmong-Lao Veterans Day!

(Note: Cities with large populations of Hmong-Lao refugees recognize May 14th as Hmong-Lao Veterans Day. May 14, 1975 was the last day of the airlift evacuation of Hmong-Lao soldiers and their families from Laos to a refugee camp in Thailand.)

This program was part of our APIDA History & Heritage Month celebration in addition to the commemoration of 50 years of Southeast Asian American history.

(Fun Fact: Philip Wang is an alumnus of UCSD and co-founder of Wong Fu Productions, a popular YouTube channel that amplifies APIDA creatives.) The San Diego location opened in July 2024.

The name BOPOMOFO Cafe is based on the traditional Chinese alphabet characters: \neg , \neg , \neg , and \neg [bo, po, mo, and fo]. These four characters are the "ABCs" of the Mandarin Chinese alphabet. Co-founders Eric and Philip, both "American Born Chinese" (ABC), chose the name to reflect their heritage and shared pride in their culture.
