### **Know APIDA History!**





#### **APIDA Center learns about San Diego's Ho Chi Minh Trail!**

Hiking is a popular pastime in San Diego, especially during the summer months. And we have a spot for you...Hidden in La Jolla Shores' rocky cliffs and mansions is the Ho Chi Minh Trail. This trail offers the most scenic yet challenging hiking experience in San Diego. The hike is a 0.6-mile trail winding between narrow limestone canyon walls down to Black's Beach, a local nudist beach. This trail has steep paths, a walk across a plank, and a descent down a small drop with a rope.

The origin of the trail's name remains unknown; though many believe it was coined by surfers or students looking for a shorter passage to the shore. The nickname is believed to stem from perceived similarities between the trail's treacherous, uneven terrain and the intricate network of paths utilized by the Viet Cong during the Vietnam War (1955-1975). Ultimately, the trail bears no genuine connection to its namesake in Vietnam.

The original Ho Chi Minh Trail (Đường mòn Hồ Chí Minh) was a tactical network of trails and passages that spanned from North to South Vietnam. It was named by the United States after Hồ Chí Minh (1890–1969), the revolutionary leader and president of North Vietnam, who was recognized for his pursuit of national unification but also criticized for the authoritarian policies that contributed to conflict and suffering during the Vietnam War. The trail became operational in early 1959, enabling North Vietnamese forces to infiltrate and disrupt the troops and supply lines of South Vietnam, Cambodia, and Laos. By 1974, it had evolved into a network of marked jungle roads with underground facilities such as hospitals, fuel storage tanks, and supply caches. It served as the main supply route for the North Vietnamese throughout the war, paving the way for their success in finally invading South Vietnam in 1975.

Referring to the San Diego trail by a name linked to a sensitive and difficult time in history can overlook its broader context. In recent years, some have begun calling it the Saigon Trail to distance it from the political weight of "Ho Chi Minh Trail." However, neither name reflects the trail's actual history or cultural relevance, as it has no connection to Vietnam. Recent petitions have called for a new name to acknowledge the trail's controversial associations and to demonstrate greater awareness and respect for those still impacted by the Vietnam War.






### **APIDA Center presents at MLA!**
