APIDA Center learns about Versailles!

Twenty years ago on this date in history - August 29, 2005 - Hurricane Katrina hit New Orleans in Louisiana, including the community of "Versailles. The name refers to the "Versailles Arms Apartment" which was the New Orleans East public housing project where Vietnamese refugees had first resettled after fleeing the Fall of Saigon in 1975. These Vietnamese refugees built a thriving working-class community outside of New Orleans. When the levees broke flooding 80% of the city, the Vietnamese in Versailles found themselves fleeing once again. At this time, Father Vien Nguyen was the pastor of the Mary Queen of Vietnam Church. He called people back for mass; under his leadership, Versailles was rebuilt faster than other neighborhoods in New Orleans due to the care and connection of the community and they did this without much government help.

After Hurricane Katrina passed and as Versailles residents pursued a redevelopment plan, the mayor of New Orleans signed an executive order to convert a deep pit in the wetlands of eastern New Orleans, known as Chef Menteur, into a landfill. Dumping into Chef Menteur allowed toxins to leak into Versailles. Youth from the Vietnamese American Young Leaders Association of New Orleans (VAYLA-NO) protested to shut down the landfill. Environmental groups such as the Sierra Club and Black Americans from the Southern Christian Leadership Conference joined. Because of this cross-cultural solidarity, the landfill was shut down. Vietnamese and Black Americans also worked together in other ways. For example, they stopped developers from profiting off the Katrina disaster and they fought for more resources. Father Vien Nguyen said, "Now, no one would dare speak about rebuilding New Orleans without mentioning our community, because they know we are back. They know we are here."

The APIDA Center is reminded of our March trip to New Orleans where we visited Versailles and the Mary Queen of Vietnam Church. A student said, "This trip helped me to gain a deeper understanding of the important part the Asian American community played in shaping our country into the place it is today. I found it interesting how a significant amount of the Vietnamese population came to New Orleans when fleeing to the United States in the 1970's and started a whole new life for themselves. In doing so, they changed the city with their contributions to its culture, economy, and culinary scene." As the 50th anniversary of the Fall of Saigon, 2025 marks 50 years of Southeast Asian American history. The APIDA Center will continue to host programs to commemorate that.
